Performances consisted of a variety of dance styles. Everything from Congo to fusion dances. Another main highlight were two large dance productions that showcased an evolution of dance and music, as well as a medley of English and Tamil songs and dance styles.

This thankful tradition is based off of the time old tale of farmers collecting rice stalks from crop fields. They would bring these stalks home, pound them to get the rice grains, and then boil the grains. The rising of the rice, and the subsequent overflow is known as "pongal". The pongal is then offered to the sun in thanks of a successful harvest.

This event is celebrated with lots of food, singing, and dancing to thank god for providing us with so much each year. It is yet another chance for everyone to gather and be thankful for everything that is afforded to them. This is another way in which TCASD displays the importance of our culture.
